It's taken generations of pieces to come together, and finally, everything is in place. Her best friend Shinobu's mind is broken, Young Dread is aligned with her enemy John, and the bloodthirsty watchers are awakened and gathered. Now there is nothing that can stop the power of time. But Quin will no longer be a pawn. Quin is a seeker. She stands on the light in a shadowy world. She will face vengeance of the past and its enemies and save herself and those she loves, or she will die trying. What I liked: *** spoiler-FREE REVIEW *** (Unless you have read the Seeker and The Traveler - there will be spoilers for those two.) I loved the seeker and traveler for the most part, and I'd be looking forward to waiting for Disruptor for about a year (exactly, actually!). I'm so glad to say that I enjoyed this conclusion novel, and that it summed up the series perfectly. Three books are good, but Disruptor is easily the strongest in the new series. This book picks up pretty much where Traveler left off - with Quin trapped there (in-between, without space), and Shinobu controlling his focus. John is training with Maud, Young Dread, and he's starting to see that in order to become a real seeker, he has to take a different direction than he had before. Quin meets an unexpected ally in-between, while Shinobu meets a dangerous enemy. Quin, Shinobu, and John are the worlds apart, but their paths will collide one more time as shadowy secrets are drawn to light and history unfolds. Finally, finally, we get the whole story. Finally things start to get into place. This conclusion brings all the light - the history of dreadlocks, history seekers, a glimpse of medallions, why seeker tech is so advanced, even if it seems that seekers were supposed to be in the Middle Ages. I like how all of the puzzle pieces got together. I'm the kind of person who needs and demands explanations, especially when it comes to the sci-fi/fantasy world - and Dayton definitely delivered. As with all books in this series, the world building is impeccably crafted. I personally think this world seeker series is unique, ya and otherwise. The idea of shame and magic might not be there, but the world of design, and bizarre history are incredibly different compared to other similar YA books. Plus, which is mostly in Scotland, which was awesome. How many YA novels are set in Scotland (and don't do with fae)? This book is told from many different POVs - which could be a good or bad thing. I think this aspect worked on this novel (and the whole series), but other readers probably don't love multiple POVs. But Dayton is doing a great job with it. The story is not just about Quin, John, and Shinobu. Maud is a very important character, as is Dex (new to this story), and Nott (recurring character). Quin has a bit of another role in this book. She is stuck in-between (there), so she has no thick running. She's not trying to take down that person or that, and she's not working on her life. Rather, she tries to get out of the in-between and find Shinobu. But to do this, she needs Dex's help. Dex is the man who rescues him in-between. He is a little unstable mentally, but he has a lot of information and is a very important story, especially in the end. But back to Quin - while her role isn't as key as it was in the other two books, it's very important to the story. We learn so much from Dex because of Quin's perseverance. Shinobu gets the worst end of the stick, in this book. His mind controls focus, and he can barely remember if he saved Quin, or if he left him, or if she ran from him (he left him). And then he is taken and deceived by a dangerous enemy who tortures her to keep him under her control. But Shinobu is a powerful mentally and physically, and bouts of clarity, he knows that he needs to find Quin in-between and protect him from one controlling him. John... John changes the most, in this novel and the series as a whole. Remember how he was to get Shinobu, and almost killed Quin? He's not that guy anymore. He has been training with Young Dread, and he is a savior for children. He's no longer trying to destroy the homes of the seekers - he's trying to save them. John is no longer a villainous character. I like how Dayton turns his character's development around, and molds John into a better, redeemed person. And he really earns this redemption at the end of the book. John used to hate Shinobu, but John is the one who tries to save Shinobu from the true villain of the story. There are two romances in this book! Quin and Shinobu have separated most of the novels, but they each spend the entire novel trying to fight their way back to each other. I usually hate that romantic separation, but it really worked in this book, for some reason. I like these two together (the reunion was sweet). There is another romance between John and Maud! It was more subtle and barely there, but it's sweet. The end of this book (and series) is very, very satisfying. I felt like all my questions were answered, and I liked where all the characters ended up, in terms of development. I felt like each character also ended up where they needed to be physically (epilogue! Gah!). I love it when the author doesn't feel the need to have a heartbreaking ending to the series. What I didn't like: Overall I thought pacing out the book was good, but I'll say that the start was a little slow. I don't remember much from Traveler, so it definitely took me some chapters to get back into the story. After some time, though, I was zipping through the pages. I couldn't put down the book! Do I recommend it: If you've made it so far in the series, or even if you're just a read-finder, finish the series! It's a series that gets better and doesn't really suffer the result of a slump. There wasn't anything too disappointing about the series, except perhaps a love triangle scare from the seeker (which disappears immediately, the flyer and then, and looking back it was a pretty harmless love triangle). If you love science fiction and fantasy, this series combines both an intriguing and thought-provoking way. Rating:4 stars. I'm interested to see what new projects the author will share with us next! I would love to read more sci-fi/fantasy blend, but I also think the author could do well with either the genre alone or something completely new. No matter what, I'm here for it! ... More... More
